## From Pastor Kamp's Desk

### SELFISH SPEECHES



The past couple of weeks I have given considerable attention to the mounting tensions in the Middle East. As the Hamas terror organization has led a violent attack on the nation of Israel, and as Israel has responded with military strikes seeking to eradicate Hamas from the neighboring Gaza strip, I have observed this conflict with growing apprehension for I can perceive within these actions a type of war that I have only read about in history books. Added to this, I for the first time see war through the lens of a father who fears its power to take children – which it already has. I frame the conflict in these terms to explain why what I desire above all is deescalation. To witness calmness from those who have the responsibility speaking of and into the conflict.

To my horror, those who have taken up the mic and are given the majority of attention from our media are those who have framed it in the most intense terms and who have proposed the most extreme responses. We have politicians who are saying this was a direct attack upon America, which of course, it is not. We have others who have solely blamed the victims, which of course, is completely false. We have others who have proposed all-out war against nations that have done nothing – framing it as the war to end all wars, which of course, is pure madness to anyone who has taken a single history class.

Do these politicians truly believe what they are saying? I honestly do not believe so. I believe they know that what they are saying is blatantly false. Instead, I believe they are making such speeches to earn political points; believing that what they are saying promotes their political careers and furthers their future influence and power. Their speeches are purely selfish, furthering only their own ambitions and goals. What this might mean is that our leaders are willing to risk war for a few points of approval.

The fact that these are the people who have been allowed to frame the conversations within America frustrates me. The fact that such people have been able to stand on stages and speak so foolishly without the surrounding politicians and crowds telling them to immediately be quiet angers me. And perhaps most significantly, the fact that these people believe such language and framing is desired by us saddens me.

These are the personalities and people which have started to take over shaping the course of our country and culture. The type of person which I expect on a reality television show is given the ability to shape global policy. It makes me desire so much for another way.

As we have started the *Believe* series, I have appreciated how in each chapter in the children's story book there is a blatant "Jump to Jesus" section which frames how everything we believe is shaped and centered around Jesus. I found myself doing the same thing these past weeks concerning our leaders and their language. I found myself jumping to Jesus asking the question about how He would lead today? How would He speak to His people today? What might His message be? And how would we who listen to Him be shaped by Him?

Jesus is the perfect leader. Jesus displays the perfect example in His willingness to lay down His life for His own. Jesus speaks not selfishly, but selflessly, instilling calm confidence in those who listen to Him. And so, I ask of myself, are those leaders whom I am listening to regularly using the language of Christ? Not necessarily using church language, but selfless language. Do I support and encourage those who actually lead by sacrifice? Or do my watching and listening habits contribute to polling data that informs politicians to speak dramatically and desperately?

But finally, when I reflect on places in which I have the responsibility to lead, do I look and speak like Christ? Do those who look at and listen to me perceive a calm confidence because of Christ? Do I selflessly serve others as Christ my King selflessly served His church?



#### **Human Needs**

In her compelling article, They aren't special needs. They are human needs, Amy Julia Becker powerfully details the inaccuracy of the term "special needs." All people have the same human needs for mobility, access to public spaces, respect, and more, she teaches. We need mutual relationships where everyone's needs are met. "We are invited to be human together."

Her words remind me that while many classify me as different because of my mobility aid and communication device, these are merely tools that meet my human needs of communication and movement.

As you peruse this newsletter, I hope that you, too, find Becker's article thought-provoking. You will also find a fantastic article on indicators of an anti-ableist, accessible church and an inspiring story about Cadets who significantly increased accessibility in their city. It's a great reminder that thoughtful, practical actions make a difference as we love each other well in our human needs.

#### "They aren't special needs. They are human needs."

My friend Jay Wolf gave this beautifully concise explanation of why the term "special needs" is problematic. To say that his wife Katherine, who uses a walker and a wheelchair, has "special needs" isn't accurate. Nor is it accurate to call it "special needs" when we create an Individualized Education Plan with and for our daughter Penny.

Katherine has the same human needs as everyone else. She needs mobility. She needs access to bathrooms and public spaces and transportation.

Penny has the same human needs too. She needs food. She needs shelter. She needs meaningful relationships. She needs to be respected and loved.

We are all invited into relationships of mutuality in which we give from what we have and receive what we need from the loving support and kindness of the people around us. We are all invited to adjust our spaces and expectations and busy schedules in order to accommodate one another. We are invited to slow down and open up to our own needs.

We are invited to recognize that the needs of the people around us are no more or less special than our own. We are invited to be human together.

#### 30 Indicators of an Anti-ableist, Fully Accessible Church

As a person with a disability entering a church that models accessibility in every way, I can be confident that...

Strangers do not ask what's wrong with me or pray for my healing without my asking for it.

The church has a bathroom I can use.

Strangers do not steer clear of me because of the way I walk, communicate, or look.

I am assured there is a plan for my escape in the event of a fire.

People do not touch my body, mobility device, or service animal without asking.

I don't worry about how the communion elements are distributed or what's in them.

I know that as a hard of hearing person, I can still participate because hearing assistance technology is in place, it's functioning properly, microphones are used, and people utilize them without reservation.

I know I can safely eat at potlucks, coffee time, and other gatherings because food is labeled, options are provided, and utensils are available.

I have options for where to sit in the sanctuary because there are pew cutouts or accessible seating options in multiple locations.

My church prints large-print bulletins and has large print Bibles. If I need other accommodations for visual impairments I can just ask and I know my needs will be met without anyone acting like I'm a nuisance.

When my church has virtual gatherings, services, or presentations, closed captioning is always available.

Leaders at my church describe important visual aids and images on screens for blind people, and verbal cues and directions are spoken as well as printed.

If I want to attend a Bible study or educational class, I know I'll be able to access the materials because they are compatible with screen readers and are available in accessible formats such as audio. My church also emails church bulletins and worship liturgies in advance.

I can access all areas of the church, including the pulpit area, without assistance.

If I disclose that I have a mental health challenge or disability, people won't question, challenge, or doubt me.

My church always asks attendees about their accessibility needs prior to an event.

People do not assume what I need without checking with me first.

People do not assume that I can't answer for myself because I use a walker, wheelchair, service animal, or aide.

People look at me and not my companion, interpreter, or communication device during conversation.

I won't be asked to find another church or not return because of my disability, a family member's disability, or disruptive behavior.

People do not assume my speech difference means that I am unable to understand them.

My church leaders understand that people learn in different ways and they use multisensory approaches with sermons and presentations.

My gifts and contributions are welcomed and affirmed, and I am expected to participate and serve along with others.

I know I'll be able to park close to church if I need to because ample accessible parking is available; or, if I don't drive, transportation is offered.

People don't wear perfume or cologne at my church and the air is adequately filtered and circulated for those with compromised immune systems or asthma.

I am encouraged to attend Sunday school, youth programs, small groups, or adult education, and will have individualized support or accommodations if I need them.

There is a quiet place I can go if I am overstimulated or need to move.

I know what to expect because pictures and descriptions on websites, social stories, or other aids are available to help reduce my anxiety about things that are new and unknown.

Support is provided for me if I need it so that my family members are able to fully participate in church activities.

When I advocate for myself or ask for an accommodation, people will listen and act, instead of dismissing my needs as not being a priority.

#### Cadet Group Builds 16 Accessibility Ramps for Local Businesses

Sixteen businesses in Stratford, Ont., are more accessible thanks to a project led by 14-year-old Nathaniel as a part of the Servant Leader Award for Calvinist Cadets.

Nathaniel has just completed his final year of Calvinist Cadets with Stratford Christian Reformed Church, where his dad, Jonathan DeWeerd, served as co-head leader. Cadets is the boys' club ministry offered in many Christian Reformed churches. Participants in the ministry are encouraged to complete tasks to earn badges and awards.

Nathaniel and his dad got the idea to create accessibility ramps for Stratford businesses last summer when they were walking downtown. Nathaniel noticed some existing ramps and asked his dad about their importance.

DeWeerd said, "It's hard to wrap your head around how some of these buildings had no way for (some) people to get in."

DeWeerd is the chief building official at the City of Stratford and knew that the Accessibility Advisory Committee in Stratford would be open to partnering with his son to create more ramps for the city.

The two approached the committee in the late fall and were connected to the businesses that needed ramps. The committee also coordinated getting the ramps to those businesses. Bickell's Flooring donated paint for the ramps, and Akins-Brewer Lumber donated the lumber.

With the supplies and plans, Nathaniel led six cadets in creating the sixteen ramps to be positioned in doorways to get over sills or gaps. Using the wood shop at Stratford CRC and working during the club's regular meeting time, it took about three to four weeks to build them, and Nathaniel spent time outside of Cadets to ensure that they were ready in time for the city's Accessibility Week (May 28-June 3).

DeWeerd said they've done other building projects in the community before, including making picnic tables for a school auction, but this is the first time the Stratford Cadets have done something specifically for the city.

Nathaniel shared about how part of his inspiration came from creating a more accessible city for people like his papa, his mom's father, who had a stroke a year ago and has lost his vision. DeWeerd said he's proud of his son for "stepping up and starting this journey of leadership."

Nathaniel said he wants to help people because Jesus helped people, and he hopes "that this inspires someone to do something for their community as well." Nathaniel plans to be a junior counsellor for Cadets at Stratford CRC next year.

Dear Church Families,

As we work our way in the new school year, we want to thank you for your help in providing for our needs last school year! We are grateful for the family of supporters who generously provided financial gifts, who gave time as volunteers, and who prayed and continue to pray for our students, staff, and families. Our annual tuition assistance goals and needs were met and surpassed, and many other needs were completely funded for the school year. We praise God for this! We have updates & information in this letter that we hope will help you better understand how your involvement continues to impact our ministry and the students and families we serve together.

Since the graduation of our 41 seniors in May, we have been reflecting on the academic success of this graduating class and are thankful to see a return to our "normal" with all of our high school seniors graduating and 88% pursuing plans to attend a 2 or 4 year college, university, or entrance into a trade school. We now are following these graduates to see how these plans have been fulfilled, or in some cases altered since May.

Over the summer months, our Executive Director search team worked through the interview process with Dan Meester, our current high school principal. The recommendation was given to the board for Dan to move into this position as Bob Ippel moves into retirement. The board approved the recommendation, and we look forward to having Dan serve in this role starting next school year. We will now start the process of seeking a new High School Principal.

We are excited to share that Celine Bia, a Rehoboth Alum from 2015, will be joining our administration team as our new Finance Director. Nathaniel Feddes returned to Rehoboth in August and is serving as our Operations Director, with oversight of Facilities, Transportation, and Food Service. Darius Yazzie, a Rehoboth Alum from 2011, has taken over the Transportation Manager role, and Drucilla Anderson has taken over as our Food Service Manager. We are currently working to fill the vacant Admissions Coordinator position. We are amazed at God's provision in providing for our staffing needs!

We continue to move forward with project needs and will be introducing our Community Builders Campaign later in the winter. This campaign will focus on completing funding for the Kuipers Gym Addition and also creating a community space in our campus commons for our middle school, high school, and broader Gallup community to enjoy. We hope to share more information in the coming months to encourage your involvement.

This school year we continue to be grateful and Amazed as we reflect on God's faithfulness over the past 120 years. A testament to Rehoboth's life shaping community is that each one of our 15 new staff members for the 2023-24 school year are either alumni, current parents, former staff, or teachers who did their student teaching at Rehoboth. We are also thrilled to see our student enrollment increase again with 430 students in our K-12 program, and 52 students in our Early Childhood Center (Pre-K). Please continue to pray for our teachers throughout the school year, and also for our administrative team as we work through the many staffing changes.

Thank you again for being a part of the Rehoboth story!



#### Praise God for machines!

Dear Friends and Family,

We give praises to God that our first planting season in Jinotega, was a success! We heard from farmers this whole summer. "The bean plants are doing good Jesse. They grow strong and very fast, but we will see how good the beans grow." Then, around July rain fell less frequently and in lower volumes. Some of the producers in our program started to get worried, because that is when the beans are growing in their pods. At the start of August we held a community meeting in San Marcos, where most of the farmers in our program live. Our meeting was focused on the harvest, and a new threshing machine we purchased to help them lower costs. They were excited to see and try the machine, the news helped to lift their spirits. We ended our meeting, giving thanks to God, and asking for His blessing on the fields and families of these men, who are becoming our friends.

By the middle of August, bean fields were ready to harvest! Producer Julio L. was the first to ask for the threshing machine. We brought it to his four acre field of beans where he had his crop drying under the sun, crisp and ready to go. Julio was excited to see us, and we finished threshing the beans by 5 p.m. Julio's son said the threshing work of these beans can last up to five days when beating the bean plants by hand, using sticks, and this season they completed it in one! This saved Julio five days of labor and salaries. This time saving machine allowed him to bring his crop to market quicker, while the prices were higher, and save on labor costs! Julio was able to harvest

seventeen quintals (a quintal is a 100 lb sack) of beans, he said he was very, very happy! Unfortunately, Julio suffered a fall and injured his knee this season. He was not able to get out to his field as much as he wanted to. We could tell he was beat on some days. However, Darwin, our team agronomist kept visiting him. We all kept praying for him, and let him know we were there to support his crops and his family. At the end of his harvest, Julio says he likes working with us, he thanks God, and says he works with what the Lord provides. The Lord gave him more than expected despite the low rainfall.

We have started to notice a change with the farmers manner of work in San Marcos. Just like Julio L., they are giving more praise to God! Their vocabulary is changing. Their attitudes are becoming warmer. We can see the Holy Spirit is working on their hearts, to love Him more!

#### Dry weather forecast

The El Niño weather phenomenon was starting to change the weather for this first planting cycle. El Niño is when the surface

waters of the equatorial pacific ocean get warmer. We have experienced warmer than usual temperatures in our region. There is a forecasted drought for Central America until May 2024. North of the city of Jinotega is Lake Apanas, we see the water levels are getting lower. While we have only lived in Jinotega for three years, the water is at the lowest levels since we moved here.

The low rainfall has caused many farmers to change what crops they were going to plant for the second cycle. Depending on where they live, some farmers have decided to skip planting for the second cycle. The dry weather has also made us change our plans too! We really wanted to plant a new hybrid corn variety to demonstrate for the producers in our agricultural program. Since no rain fell in September, we couldn't plant corn and decided to plant beans because of the shorter growing season.

#### Avodah Farm

Crop demonstrations are one of the many opportunities to take advantage of when we purchase Finca Avoda! In September, we sent out a letter asking for your support to help us purchase a small farm. We were not able to close the purchase of the property we chose, because the seller did not want to give us copies of the deeds and title work. We had to walk away. We were disappointed, but we believe that God has an even better property for us, our search continues. Your prayers and support allowed us to add Darwin to our team. You have also helped us with the purchase of the threshing machine. God has demonstrated His faithfulness through you. Thank you for showing Christ's love in Jinotega!

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


Victoria Falls ~ A wonder of the natural world

### RETREATS FROM THE BUSYNESS OF THE EVERYDAY

With long workdays and hectic academic schedules, many in our congregation struggle to find rest. Because of this, we try to host an outing each month as a way of disconnecting from the busyness of everyday life for fun, fellowship, and rest. Sometimes this comes in the form of game nights or trips to Cape Town, but as the seasons change and warmer weather returns, we try to get outside to enjoy God's creation.

In August, we took a group to Paarl Rock to hike this interesting mountain and enjoy a picnic afterwards. This was a great opportunity to get to know some of the students in the church better as we hiked, talked, and ate together. As a result of this outing, a small group of students has formed to meet up simply to enjoy a break from their studies over a shared meal. Each time we meet, the group grows as people "taste and see. (Ps. 34:8)" I encourage them to invite others to participate in this small act of resistance to the busy pace of university life and signpost of the Kingdom of God.

Last month (September), we hosted our annual church retreat. We normally have this retreat on a farm in the rural community of Bonnievale, but due to some construction work being done, we instead gathered in Kleinmond (right on the Atlantic Ocean!). As opposed to the daytrip outings we host each month, this retreat was an opportunity for people to take a whole weekend to rest from their work and studies, enjoying the beach, hiking, fellowship, and good food.





We had families and students from ten different countries join us for this retreat! Though the weather was a bit unpredictable, people got outside to explore the beach, Christina joined a group of women on a walk in town, and I played games with the middle and high school students. In addition, we held a workshop on "Cultivating Family Worship," where I spoke about the importance of worship in the home for growing our faith and for the spiritual formation of

children in particular. On Sunday, we worshipped in a local church and had a braai ("grill out") under the warm sun.

For some, this is one of the only times they will be able to get away from work. One such person is Ken, who works on one of the local wine farms. After the retreat, he sent a Whatsapp message saying, "Thank you so much for the wonderful time we had to switch off from Stellies!" Another member shared that this retreat was a reminder of how thankful they are for a family like Stellenbosch International Fellowship. These statements, and many others like them, are the reason we do this, and serve as a preview of the fellowship and rest that we will enjoy in the Kingdom.



In August, September and October, we cohosted seminars put on by a ministry we partner with here in Stellenbosch: Krux. Each of these seminars reflected a different aspect of Krux's effort to provide theological discipleship and engage young adults (both Christian and non-Christian) with the message of Christianity at the intersections of faith, culture, and art.

The first seminar "Calvin and the Reformation" focused on the theology of John Calvin, the impact of the Reformation and its ongoing signficance today. The second seminar "Spiritual Formation" introduced participants to various practices for personal devotion and growth in relationship with God. Finally, the third seminar "Understanding Old Testament Wisdom Literature" served as an introduction and discussion of how we interpret and faithfully appropriate wisdom literature for following God in the world today. These events received a lot of positive feedback, such as the following from one person who joined the spiritual formation seminar: "This was such a good reminder of the need to connect with God and different ways of doing it through Scripture and prayer." We hope to host more seminars like these in the future as a way of further equipping the church and thoughtfully engaging the broader community.



Hello Everyone,



Thank you for supporting us with your prayers. We have had a very eventful last few months.

In the middle of August, we took a vacation to the Mediterranean Sea. We enjoyed relaxing on the rock beaches, playing games together as a family, and taking a boat cruise around the area. The clearness of the sea makes it possible to see the bottom at over 4 yards. After vacation, we went to a conference that helped us to draw closer to God and focus on our relationship with Him. It was very encouraging and refreshing.

In September, a team from Bettendorf, Iowa came for 10 days. They helped us out on one of our Island Weekends. The ladies worked at the henna stations while the men handed out comic books that briefly explain the gospel. Over the 2 days that the henna team was working, 184 people heard the gospel from over 11 different people groups. The Bettendorf team helped us with 2 community center nights. Each week we went to a local mall and looked for people who spoke English. We invited them to come to our community center. People who had been personally invited came to both nights. We were able to have spiritual conversations with some of them. Over the time that the team was here, we handed out 919 pieces of literature. As their leader said, "That's 919 windows to the gospel that we opened for people."



Throughout this time, we have continued in our normal ministry opportunities. Dan has helped with a 7-week Bible study engaging 4-5 men with stories of the Bible. These men enjoyed having a place where they could learn about Christianity and discuss openly the questions that they had.

Tammie has been able to meet with a couple of ladies individually and share the gospel with them. Our online ministry team has been working on new ways to try and reach people in the city, especially women. Our church has been working through some lessons on what it means to be a member of the church and has recently started a mid-week Bible Study. We are working to move toward healthier relationships and accountability.



#### Big Five Prayer Requests

- 1. Pray for the men who attended the Bible Study: Roger, Dustin, Henry, and Evan. May they be moved by the Word of the Lord.



# MISSIONARY SUPPORT

How Does it Work?

Resonate.



Resonate has two types of missionaries:

RESONATE CAREER-STAFF MISSIONARIES are employed by the CRCNA and report to a Resonate Regional Mission Leader. Their ministry, budget, benefits, and fundraising goals are administered by Resonate. Resonate provides advancement support, planning and logistics, encouragement, learning, and care for these missionaries. Resonate Career-Staff missionaries use the updated missionary support model.

partner Missionaries are employed by other agencies or institutions and are supervised by the staff of those institutions. Their ministry, budget, benefits, and fundraising goals are not administered by Resonate. Resonate provides advancement support, planning and logistics, encouragement, learning, and care for these missionaries. Partner missionaries' fundraising goals are controlled by their employer.

There is a misunderstanding about what percentage of funds Resonate career-staff missionaries have to raise.


Resonate Career-Staff Missionary budgets vary based on ministry location and missionary family structure. The average cost of a full-time missionary is estimated using the missionary support model.

While it is true that many missionaries raise the majority of their ministry costs, general giving and Ministry Shares fund various missionary program costs as well. In 2014, our updated missionary support model was adopted, which covers roughly 75% of the total cost of the Resonate Career-Staff Missionary Program through direct giving. General giving, including ministry shares, is raised to fund the remaining 25%. Additionally, Resonate's advancement team fundraises to help close any remaining gap between the cost of the mission and what has been raised.

The updated missionary support model is similar to the previous model - but less complicated.

Previously, missionary support goals were calculated in a complicated process that used a formula based on actual expenses for each missionary in 8 designated categories. Now, support goals are based on individual budgets.

Resonate's advancement team will fundraise for the "gap" between what is raised by missionaries and the total cost for the missionary program.

About one-third of the funds for the Resonate Career-Staff Missionary Program comes from general giving and Ministry Shares. Resonate's advancement team will continue to raise these funds to ensure that missionaries are not solely responsible for the funding of the missionary program.

The Johanna Veenstra Fund exists to help missionaries who have challenges in fundraising.


This board-designated fund assists missionaries, especially those from diverse and minority backgrounds, to remain in their ministry context when they have limited connections to traditional Christian Reformed Church congregations and supporters. It will continue to assist those qualified missionaries who have difficulty meeting their fundraising goal.

## God's Word Transforms Lives


John in India wanted to be like his father. "My father was a dedicated idol worshipper. I wanted to follow in his footsteps," he says.

His father died when John was just a young boy, making his childhood difficult. As a teen, John found alcohol more alluring than books. "I was simply drifting through life until I met Christ," he shares. When he attended his first Bible study, the Lord spoke to him through the story of Jacob. "Light began to dawn and my life changed."

Now, John seeks to follow Jesus, instead of his father. He leads 10 Bible League Bible studies, reaching 15 families with the Gospel.

#### **COLINA DE LUZ**

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ and Friends of MCCA,

It is with gratitude and compassion that I share our ministry with you. My wife Suzie and I founded Colina de Luz 36 years ago along with Doctor Abel Mellado from San Pablo Church in Playas de Tijuana. Our goal was to come as missionaries representing our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. We had heard there was an orphanage that was in dire need of help, so we chose to visit – and it was in dire need! God spoke to my heart that someday this would become a lighthouse on a hill, so on July 4,1987 when it officially became ours, we by faith, named it Colina de Luz (Hill of Light). Over the years Colina has become much more of a Christian Home for Children than an orphanage. We consider it a true honor to be able to care for God's precious children, especially the ones that the devil has badly bruised. Our main goal is to present Christ to them and then help them grow in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. We do that in numerous ways.

Nearly all of these children come from abusive backgrounds and have been hurt in many ways. We know that we have a tough job in caring for them, so we show them that we love them unconditionally, even when they do wrong. We do this by showing them patience, compassion, love and yet sternness when needed, but always mixed with God's loving grace. We care for them when they hurt by giving them what they need to heal. Suzie and I have a combined one hundred plus years of experience working with youth and children. If you add in our staff of eighteen, it is a great many times more than 100 years!

We currently have 56 children living at Colina and have already raised 700, many of whom walk with Jesus and some who work in ministries inside and outside of Colina. 


The result is that 100% of all monetary donations goes directly to purchase food products.
