



# From Pastor Kamp's Desk

"If you want to go fast, go alone; if you want to go far, go together."

(African Proverb)



This past week as I invested three days to travel to Grand Rapids, to read numerous documents, to sit in meetings, and to listen to reports with other members of the Christian Reformed Church the question of "why denominations?" not only entered my head but, by different routes, found its way onto the floor in some of these discussions.

The past couple of years have been challenging within our church leading to the decision of some congregations to leave the denomination: to go their own way, find their own path, make decisions alone. After sitting so long in meetings and reports the offer to "go fast, go alone" is quite appealing.

We can observe the lure of this appeal through the numerous churches that have chosen to become independent, nondenominational, or flatly split so many times that they are merely a denomination of one. Churches today desire to go fast, to grow rapidly, to make changes quickly, to become something new and exciting tomorrow without any accountability to history or fellow believers.

The word "accountability" is immensely important in the Christian faith, and it is the word that makes denominations like the CRCNA absolutely necessary. Denominations hold us accountable to one another, which is especially important when we do not want to be held accountable.

The Bible proclaims in Christ that we ought to:

- "Confess your sins to one another and pray for one another that you may be healed." (James 5:16)
- "Speak truth to one another for we are members one of another." (Ephesians 4:25)
- "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ." (Galatians 6:2)
- "Obey your leaders and submit to them, for they keep watch over your soul as one who will give account."

  (Hebrews 13:17)

Church structure is the way in which we covenant (or promise) to hold each other so accountable. I thank God that I have been called to pastor in a church where the Council leads. I am grateful for those who serve in the Council at First CRC because it means I never go it alone. The Council holds me accountable to my calling. The Council holds me accountable to the church's history. The Council holds me accountable in my own faith and walk.

This accountability demands monthly travel, time, meetings, reports, and assessments not only from myself, but from every person on the Council. Even if we walk away from some meetings thinking little work has been accomplished; the truth is that we have held each other accountable and that is significant. None of us are free to walk alone, to make decisions alone, to be accountable to no one. This might mean we walk slowly, but we do walk together.

This is the truth which I reflected on with my extensive time traveling to and in meetings in Grand Rapids. The questions simply are: Is accountability worth it? Is accountability worth the cost of a denomination? Is accountability worth the amount of time and energy it takes to change the direction of a denomination?

Those who leave will be able to turn on a dime alone without accountability. Those who remain may be jealous of how sharp the Titanic turned, but we will do so together and Lord willing, we won't hit an iceberg together.

The blessing for those who go together; is that we go far. We are each pilgrims whose path is destined for eternity. May God gives us the grace to walk together faithfully even if it is slowly, remembering that the righteous are often compared to trees which slowly grow in size and strength.







Dear Friends,

Neal and Martha Kooyers came to Papua New Guinea as missionaries with Wycliffe Bible Translators in 1961 and began working in Madiwai village. In 1968 Neal built a house at bordering the airstrip at Ambunti alongside the Sepik River. With fewer mosquitos at this location the translation was more efficiently completed. The housing also provided accommodations or logistical support to other WBT missionaries working in the area. Though the years many more buildings were added to the Ambunti property and it now



includes housing for mission staff, a repair shop, a large training room and the field offices of Pacific Island Ministries.


Old pictures show that six raintrees or monkeypod trees were planted when the house was built. For the past 50 years, these fast-growing trees became massive in size with tree trunks of over four feet in diameter providing umbrellas of shade of up to 90 feet in diameter. Sadly, to protect nearby houses

from possible storm damage from any falling limbs, some of the big trees in the yard had to be cut down.

Recently, yet another one of these giant raintrees was felled before the Sepik River erosion had a chance to undercut the tree's roots and topple it causing even more damage. Since the tree was planted over 12 feet of the river bank has eroded. Unlike redwood trees, raintrees cannot live for millennia as their almost horizontal branches grow too long and break, insects invade and then the decay process begins causing a steady decline.

Certainly, the erosion of time, that second law of thermodynamics is confirmed in the world around us and even with our own bodies. The Bible reminds us we are to lay up for ourselves treasures in heaven, not in this world where moth and rust destroy and thieves break in and steal. The heavenly treasure is indestructible.

As the work of PIM continues, we have had some of those who started working the in early years with PIM move on to glory. However, we see their children and grandchildren grow, advance in their education, and



then go into various vocations. We are blessed to have children of PIM employees who completed teacher's college and can now teach in PIM schools.

Founded in 1964 in Redlands, CA., Mexican Christian Children's Aid is a, 501(c)(3), Charitable Organization. It began when a group of Christian business people were moved to address the sharp contrast between the affluence in the U.S., and the abject poverty found just across our southern border in Mexico. We purchase and provide monthly bulk food deliveries and other assistance to local Christian organizations in the northern Baja region. We deliver the food donations primarily to organizations that sponsor Children's Homes and or operate periodic Feeding Programs to needy families. Along with the food, Spanish translation Bibles, Gospel Tracts, and other items are generally a part of our deliveries. Our monthly runs consist of all volunteer drivers and riders who donate their vehicles full of fuel and literally everything needed to complete the mission each time we go. The MCCA does not own or rent a building, nor are there any paid staff.

The result is that 100% of all monetary donations goes directly to purchase food products.

Jim, born an American citizen, has spent most of his adult life in Mexico with his wife Suzie managing and ministering to orphaned children. Colina de Luz was a run-down mess when they felt God's call and took it over. It is now a thriving and amazing place turning many needy kids into adolescent young men and women who love Jesus and want to serve Him with their lives. As the children grow older, Jim encourages them to learn to teach and conduct worship. He described a recent chapel service at Colina where the youth did just that. They took over a chapel service and led worship, and taught the Word and ministered to the younger children. Jim shared that he was deeply moved with tears of joy. Men of God.
