



SEEING AUTUMN BEAUTY IN UNLIKELY PLACES

When we think of natural beauty, we often think of the majestic. Raging waterfalls and snowcapped mountain peaks. Ocean beaches and desert landscapes. Alpine lakes and pine forests. You know, the images we may have as the backgrounds of our computer screens or our smart phones.

I was thinking of this a few weeks ago when I was sitting outside my house on a warm fall day. It was one of those fall days where the morning had started cool but the afternoon was heating up. I had learned as a kid that these conditions create thermal columns, rising masses of buoyant air that rise up into atmosphere. We, of course, do not see the air, the columns or the rising heat. But we can see the effects, namely birds soaring higher and higher on the thermals.

So that warm fall afternoon, I was watching the birds soar majestically high in the air. With their wingspans fully extended, the birds hardly seemed to give an effort. They circled and glided high on a blue-baked sky. Wondering what kind of bird they were, I grabbed a set of binoculars from inside, hoping they were eagles or some other magisterial bird.

This is how I learned that I had turkey vultures high in the sky over me. The vultures were not exactly as beautiful as a bald eagle. But in their way, they were beautiful. I got a little envious of their soaring freedom to see so much of the earth from such a vantage point. To them I was but a tiny dot on the landscape (though as buzzards maybe they were waiting for me to expire so they could have lunch).

In this fall season, we will see beauty of the change of leaves, the reds and golds of maples and the orange of pumpkins. But God has created beauty in so many places and we can look for the beauty of the earth in unlikely places. In turkey vultures and dried out creek beds. In bare trees and dormant grasslands. And yes, even in the first bit of frost and the first snowflakes.

Wicker Basket

The story is told of an old man who lived on a farm in the mountains of eastern Kentucky with his young grandson. Each morning, Grandpa was up early sitting at the kitchen table reading from his old worn-out Bible. His grandson who wanted to be just like him tried to imitate him in any way he could.

One day the grandson asked, 'Papa, I try to read the Bible just like you but I don't understand it, and what I do understand I forget as soon as I close the book. What good does reading the Bible do?' The Grandfather quietly turned from putting coal in the stove and said, 'Take this old wicker coal basket down to the river and bring back a basket of water.'

The boy did as he was told, even though all the water leaked out before he could get back to the house. The grandfather laughed and said, 'You will have to move a little faster next time,' and sent him back to the river with the basket to try again. This time the boy ran faster, but again the old wicker basket was empty before he returned home. Out of breath, he told his grandfather that it was 'impossible to carry water in a basket,' and he went to get a bucket instead. The old man said, 'I don't want a bucket of water; I want a basket of water. You can do this. You're just not trying hard enough,' and he went out the door to watch the boy try again.

At this point, the boy knew it was impossible, but he wanted to show his grandfather that even if he ran as fast as he could, the water would leak out before he got far at all. The boy scooped the water and ran hard, but when he reached his grandfather the basket was again empty. Out of breath, he said, 'See Papa, it's useless!'

So you think it is useless?' The old man said, 'Look at the basket.' The boy looked at the basket and for the first time he realized that the basket looked different. Instead of a dirty old wicker coal basket, it was clean.'

Son, that's what happens when you read the Bible. You might not understand or remember everything, but when you read it, it will change you from the inside out.'

Moral of the wicker basket story:

Take time to read a portion of God's word each day; it will affect you for good even if you don't retain a word.

Thought for Today: Gods Love is like the ocean, you can see its beginnings but not its end.

I really like this story because I don't retain things too well anymore...old age may have something to do with it but I just figure my brain just gets overloaded! God isn't concerned about your brains anyway; He's more concerned about your heart!
















Dear Friends at FCRC,

The night before I wrote this article, I had the opportunity to attend a large worship event.

It was a Brandon Lake concert, and it was great—and it was worship, heartfelt worship. In the midst of the lights and sounds, the projection and fog—as entertaining as that was—it was worship. Heartfelt, genuine worship.

Sometimes during our New Life services, or when I am leading at a local "Sunday" church, I will just close my eyes and listen to the voices around me, offering their praise to our God. Listening to the sounds of His children is moving. It moves in an arena of thousands, it moves in a church of a hundred or more, and it moves in a small chapel behind locked doors. Heartfelt worship of God cannot be contained, cannot be silenced—ever!

Many of you probably know "Gratitude," one of the songs we sang last night. In the first verse, Brandon Lake sings how all words fall short, how it's impossible to say anything new or to fully express gratitude to God.

The context of these lyrics is the worship of our great God, but the words also ring true for us at New Life when we think about everyone who supports us. These are our words to you: THANK YOU! You support us with prayer,

with thoughts, with well wishes, and with time, and you support us financially. THANK YOU!

This summer marked the 15th Annual Pedal for Prisoners, which is our largest fundraiser for New Life. Each year a letter is sent out, riders sign up, and people respond with a donation. Recently, New Life welcomed two new volunteers: Greg Witzenburg and Ryan Bouwkamp.

After they attend their first service, I like to ask new volunteers to share their perspectives to help those who cannot worship at Newton Correctional Facility get a feel for what it is like. Here's what Greg and Ryan had to say.



From Greg Witzenburg

This past July, I had the humbling opportunity to help with a New Life church service for the first time. I went in with no preconceived ideas, just a heart willing to serve. What I encountered moved me deeply. The worship was raw, real, and powerful—these men sang from a place of deep need and deeper hope. There was no pretense, just an honest hunger for God. Listening to them, hearing their desire to grow closer to

the One who had given them (and me) true freedom, reminded me that the Spirit of God truly knows no walls.

What struck me most were the heartfelt prayer requests—simple, honest pleas for strength, peace, forgiveness, hope, and revival. These men prayed not only for themselves but for their families, their children, their fellow inmates, and for those who came to serve. They were extremely grateful for the families who support the volunteers, making it possible for this kind of ministry to happen. I left that day not just as someone who had come to help, but as someone who had been deeply blessed. God is clearly at work behind those prison walls, and I'm thankful that God allowed me to be a part of it!



From Ryan Bouwkamp

For the men at Newton Correctional Facility, guilt is not an abstract spiritual thought but a living verdict on their record. The government has declared their sentence, and they have had to come to grips with the reality the judge has spoken into existence. Spiritually, this should sound quite familiar to us! God the Judge

is right to sentence us to eternal punishment, for we have sinned against an infinitely good and holy God. We have broken His good laws that He put in place for human flourishing.

And yet, my experience at Newton was not one of moping around and sadness. Instead, I saw men eager to learn, worship, and meet together. Visibly much more so than the people I know outside of prison! They were quick to offer prayer requests, connect with us as volunteers, and thank us gratefully. Yet I was equally, if not more, blessed by the chance to see how God works transforming lives in all places.
